NETWORKS & INFLUENCE

My peer reviewed articles, book chapters and books required co-authorship with 22 different authors and from seven different academic institutions. My editorship of 6 books has required written collaboration with over 100 authors from 9 domestic law schools, 8 foreign law schools, 8 non-legal departments of other universities, 7 NGOs, 6 law firms, numerous members of the bar, several judges on the High Court and Supreme Court of Appeal, and six (then sitting) justices from the Constitutional Court of South Africa. The primary, but by no means the sole, source of this community of scholars has been *Constitutional Law of South Africa*. I have also collaborated closely with academics in other disciplines, including development studies, education, environmental studies, HIV/AIDs law and policy, and business ethics. My editorship of two journals – as the founding, and current, managing editor of the *Constitutional Court Review* and, earlier in my career, as an editor of the *South African Journal on Human Rights* -- has further extended the range of the domestic and the international institutions that I engage. As Academic Director of the South African Institute for Advanced Constitutional, Public, Human Rights and International, South Africa's only truly legal academic NGO, I am fortunate to be in regular contact with all South African legal scholars and most of the international comparative constitutional law academics to frequent our shores. We run conferences, and then produce books, that reflect engagement with the problems thrown up by South Africa's constitutional democracy.

However, the real measure of my influence is citation by the bench, the bar and the academy. I feel confident in claiming that I have had more, *as well as a greater range*, of articles, book chapters and books cited by the Constitutional Court and the Supreme Court of Appeal, the two apex courts, over the last six or seven years than any other academic working in the field of constitutional law and disciplines that abut that field. The same claim would hold true for the range of work cited in the secondary literature. Part of the evidence for this empirical claim flows from searches of well-known databases and manual research carried out by the University of Pretoria Faculty of Law in 2009. In a mere five year span, I became the most cited full-time member of their law faculty (of some 60 members). Since I know that my citation record has only increased over the past several years while working at Wits Business School, any empirical data-based and manual research of the reach of my work will bear out this assessment.
